BOT Student Election

The Student Election is still happening according to the Official Rules for all Elections in New Zealand. We are unable to vote online.

The only change from normal for our students is that voting papers are being posted - rather than given out in their homeroom and they will post back their voting papers. Letters have been sent to all Year 9-13 students with voting papers (return postage paid envelopes enclosed) to their home addresses.

Election Day is still 22nd September 2021 with the request that they post voting papers rather than deliver them (if Covid restrictions are still in place - although, if school is open for business as usual they can be can hand delivered). Voting closes at 4pm on Wednesday, 22nd September 2021. The Voting Paper states that they can only vote for ONE candidate.

Postal votes will be accepted up until Monday, 27th September and votes will be counted on Tuesday, 28th September.

Candidates will be notified by a member of the Board of Trustees, then everyone will be emailed a Declaration of results with a follow -up in the 1st October school newsletter.

Northland Dental Update

We would like to advise, that as part of the Northland District Health Board's on-going response to the COVID-19 pandemic, there will be some disruption of our oral health services to schools and communities in the coming months.

Once we have settled into a COVID-19 Alert level 2 scenario, we will be in touch with Principals that currently have a mobile dental unit at their school, to provide an update and seek your permission to resume onsite services. Please note our dental engineer may wish to visit mobile dental units on school sites during COVID-19 Alert Levels 4 and 3 to assess their condition and ensure batteries remain charged.
