
Middle College Assembly

Rippa Rugby Reflection—Year 5&6 Girls Team

Last week we took our girls and boys Rippa Rugby teams to their first tournament, this was the junior winter sports tournament at Kensington, and our students did SO WELL. But to help you understand what this really means, I need to transport you back in time to June last year. I will focus on the girls team for this article as the boys already had great skills.



In June 2021 I enjoyed watching my eldest daughter play Rip-Rugby at a local event, she played in a girls only team (as the boys will often assume that girls aren't skilled at this type of activity and the girls never get included). I watched this girls team really gel together and perform amazingly and they LOVED it. At this point in time I hadn't started working at Excellere College, but I was hooked. Rippa Rugby is more fun than touch rugby but is still non contact compared to real-rugby. Players wear a velcro belt with 2 tags hanging, one on each side. The game is very similar to touch rugby, but instead of a 'touch' they will rip a tag and yell 'rip' and play on.

When I first introduced rippa to the girls at Excellere College, they were quite muddled, being such skilled netballers, they were throwing the rugby ball as a netball and chest passing it to their team. They were also VERY inclined to run away from the



opposition, thus losing ground instead of pressing forward and taking the 'rip'. There were 'panic passes', 'forward passes', 'off sides', 'dropped balls at the try line' and 'knockons', a very frustrating scene for someone like me lol.

However, I knew that these girls would eventually 'get it' and love it, so we kept on practising, every week I

took the Year 5 and 6's for Rippa, sometimes I just focused on the girls as I really wanted to increase their skills to make them just as good as the boys. This is where the story gets exciting - the girls are

there, they are now as good as the boys as they have improved in their skills SO much.

At the tournament last week, I watched from the sidelines with watery eyes and so much pride in my heart, all of those hours of training had paid off. The girls were a sensation, they know the game, they understand it, they really listened and were teachable and passionate about playing. They played teams that were disorganised and hadn't played before, during those games they won by a lot and the girls were gracious. We also played teams who were VERY skilled and who had obviously practised and during these games our girls matched that teams skills and often tied with them. It was such a fantastic feeling to see how far these girls had come.



I must also mention their sportsmanship and leadership. I often overheard them talking to each other to build each other up and if they had wronged another player accidently, they were very quick to help that player up off the ground and apologise. They got over any frustrations quickly and decided to leave any frustrations in the past and not let it carry on into the next game.


We are now looking forward to our next Rippa Rugby tournament on the 21st June.
