## Year 10 HĀ Wananga

From the 13-15 November the Year 10's attended a course called HA (Histories of Aotearoa). The course was held at school and lead by Justice, Rhoen, Maddie and Gabe. This course studied the histories of Aotearoa through art forms.

Day 1 was called kakano, we studied the histories of the Māori world and how it was created. Through the information we gained we created pieces of artwork using this clay type material called ko. We used it in its natural form (dry) but we also mixed it with oil to create a paste that we could paint with. We created artworks using nature patterns and the ko, and how the Māori reacted in the time that they lived in.

Day 2 was lots more fun, we created our own species. We presented those to the class then we got paired with another group to create skits about how those two worlds collided. So many laughs and fun times were made! After we created those skits we learned about how the Māori survived through the wars and land loss. Through us learning those things we created pieces of poetry that described how it would feel in that time and how we can heal through the struggles that they faced.

Day 3 was all about making our final art piece, we created a piece of artwork using the resources that the leaders provided that was supposed to reflect what the past felt like and what the future could look like. Everyone created amazing works of art and everyone's works were so original and creative.

"My experience at HĀ was definitely an eye opener. I was able to catch a glimpse of what our ancestors had gone through, just trying to fight for what they originally owned. The whole experience brought up a lot of mixed emotions like anger, sadness, and awe, but also questions came up like...why? Why didn't they listen to our cries? Why did they think it was fine to just take over and say they own our country and culture? I guess that is an answer to be left in the past. Overall I had a great time and enjoyed being able to use natural resources to create amazing pieces of art. Thank you Justice and Rhoen for taking us through that amazing journey!!" - Caylin Watkins

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
