


TT Kidz (NZ) gives children aged 6-11 a great first experience in table tennis.

Senior Art Trip to Hundertwasser Art Centre and Whangarei Art Museum

For the second year, Excellere College senior art students had the wonderful experience of visiting the Hundertwasser Art Centre. The experienced art educator Jacinda Selman coordinated a enriching experience for all the students, catered to compliment what we were learning in the classroom.

The day started outside of the gallery with learning about the history of the Whangārei harbour and Town Basin areas. Students learnt about the importance of Whangārei to the early Māori as a place to meet and also of the rich wildlife that lives here.

We were very privileged to visit the store room of the Whangārei Art Gallery. This was the first time the gallery has invited students inside of this space and the staff were thrilled with the students enthusiasm and respect for the artworks. As the teacher I loved seeing my students get excited about artworks up close. For some students, this was their first art




exhibition experience and despite everything that the internet can do, it can't replace seeing texture, brush marks and the full scale of an original painting.

After a break, we were given a tour of the Hundertwasser gallery, learning about the artists' life as a young man, his love of nature and the vast variety of paintings, screen prints, drawings, and architecture that he made throughout his lifetime.



While up on the afforested roof top, a stunning day; the students were announcing things like 'This is the best trip ever', and 'Thank-you so much for bringing us here, we love it.' Getting a 'Sound Sleep' in the Middle College
