From the Principal

Kia ora/Kamusta/haai/Annyeong haseyo Excellere College kaupapa whānau/families,

After a joyful start to Term 4 it has been wonderful to see the return of the sunshine. It is time to remind students about the importance of wearing sun hats and sunscreen whilst they are outside, I am sure everyone is aware of how intense the Northland sun is.

I'd like to take a moment to explain the ongoing industrial action by teachers and support staff and what it means for our school community. As you will be aware, members of the teachers' union have voted to take industrial action as part of ongoing negotiations with the Ministry of Education regarding pay and working conditions. This action is part of a nationwide effort by teachers and support staff to advocate for fair conditions that support both quality teaching and the wellbeing of staff and students.

At Excellere College, we respect the rights of our teachers and support staff to take part in lawful union activity, and we recognise that their goal is ultimately to ensure the best outcomes for our students. I also wish to thank the Board of Trustees for their backing and awareness during this uncertain process.

We appreciate your understanding and support during this time. We are reluctant to cause this interruption and inconvenience to students and whānau. Our shared commitment remains the same: to provide a Christ-centred education that nurtures each child to grow in faith, character, and learning. Please continue to pray for

wisdom, fairness, and unity as these discussions continue.

We are delighted to welcome Matua Paora to Excellere College on Thursdays and Fridays for Term 4. You may have heard your Year 0-10 students talk about their experience as they learn more about Te Ao Māori. Matua Paora is a skilled professional who weaves learning and experiences through a Māori/Christian lens. It has also been wonderful to have Moira Searle and Evah Pirini at school for eight weeks this term. They are second year Occupational Therapy trainees in our Junior primary classes. They have been working in Mrs Harvey and Mrs Grammer's classes. This is a rare opportunity for our school and we hope it is the beginning of a longer-term arrangement that will benefit so many students.



Thank you to Arise Church for allowing school staff to park in their carpark during the day. This has made it much easier for community members to park their vehicles in the school grounds at the end of the day. We really appreciate everyone's patience in this matter. As the school grows we will be investigating further parking options to keep our children safe. Student Achievement—Nevaeh Garrett and Her Busy Bees

Year 12 student Nevaeh Garrett is a bee keeper and a small business owner. At age 16, she has over 80 hives which she cares for. It wasn't her family who introduced her to bees but a passionate school Teacher with support from a local bee business. Last term Nevaeh brought some of her bees to school and visited classes to teach them about bees, honey and pollination.

How did you first get interested in working with bees?

I first got interested through Poroti School when I was 13 years old. My teacher and a group called Tahi Bees came to our school to teach us all about beekeeping. We learnt how bees make honey, what each type of bee does in the hive, and how pollination helps plants grow. We even got to wear bee suits, inspect real hives, and see how honey is extracted. I really enjoyed how calm and focused you have to be around bees, and that's what made me want to keep learning more.

How did you get your own bees?

After learning about bees at school, I got even more interested when a guy who used to pollinate our avocado orchard started taking me out to look at his hives and teaching me more about beekeeping. Not long after that, I got my own hive. My first bees came from a local beekeeper who sold nucs, which are small starter colonies with a queen, workers, and brood. You can buy bees like that from local beekeepers or bee suppliers in spring when colonies are growing fast.





How did you go from one hive to 80 hives?

It took a few years of hard work and learning to grow from one hive to about 80 hives. I did this by splitting strong hives each season and also buying more hives from local beekeepers who were going out of bees. To care for that many hives, I check them regularly for diseases, make sure they have enough food, and manage pests like varroa mites. The gear can be quite pricey a full hive can cost anywhere between \$180 and \$250, depending on the setup. But I really enjoy looking after them and seeing how each hive grows differently.

How did you create a business from your hobby?

As my hives increased, I started producing a lot more honey. That's when I decided to turn my beekeeping into a small business. I still get honey from my bees and sell it to

family and friends, and I also give honey to people who let us keep bees on their land. We've also become pollinators, helping my uncle's kiwifruit orchard in Te Puke and our own family orchard that my grandad owns. We don't sell our honey at markets or locally it's all shared with people we know. To process the honey, we extract it, filter it, and store it properly while following New Zealand's


